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Level 3 (7-9 marks) Comprehensive details of apparatus and a method to produce reliable data are provided to include the preparation of dilutions of the stock solution of gibberellic acid. Most variables are identified and the method states how these are controlled. Details of a control and safety are included. *There is a well-developed line of reasoning which is* 

clear and logically structured and uses scientific terminology at an appropriate level. The information presented is relevant and substantiated.

#### Level 2 (4-6 marks)

Some details of apparatus and a method to produce reliable data are provided. There is an outline of the preparation of dilutions of the stock solution of gibberellic acid. Some variables are identified and the method states how some are controlled. Details of a control or safety are included.

There is a line of reasoning presented with some structure and use of appropriate scientific language. The information presented in the most part relevant and supported by some evidence.

#### Level 1 (1–3 marks)

Apparatus and an outline method are suggested to provide some results but information, such as how to dilute the stock solution of gibberellic acid, may be missing. Some variables and safety details are omitted.

There is an attempt at a logical structure with a line of reasoning. The information is in the most part relevant.

# Indicative scientific points may include Apparatus & method:

- growing medium (e.g. soil, cotton wool, filter paper)
- suitable containers (e.g. pots/Petri dishes etc.) for growing medium
- apparatus for precise / accurate volume

measurement

- distilled/deionised water
- details of quantitative preparation of dilution series (for GA) to include volumes & final concentrations
- method of determining whether or not germination has occurred
- control included (distilled water or 0 mg dm<sup>-3</sup> GA)
  - sufficient number of values of IV (different concentrations of GA across appropriate range)

#### Variables

- independent variable = dilutions of gibberellic acid
- dependent variable = %/proportion/fraction of seeds germinated
- control variables = exposure to light/kept in dark/constant day length, watering of seeds (volume of gibberellic acid solution is not critical but the seeds must be kept wet/moist with the appropriate solution), temperature, planting density/number of seeds per container, time

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
